Second Semester Kicks Off

A time of revitalization & rebuilding

As I begin my fourth month in this role, I am hopeful and excited to spend more in-person time to make connections with students, their families, and the tribal community. Due to the program being inactive for a period of time, a significant focus has been on structuring systems, gathering information, meeting with high need students, and setting goals and objectives.

The first priorities were to sort and facilitate the receipt and delivery of 127 Native/Indigenous book titles (over 1000 books), which are now available in all of our school libraries! I read to all of the elementary classes across the district utilizing some of the new books including, We Are Water Protectors, Rough Faced Girl, Fry Bread and Sometimes I Feel Like a Fox. This was an amazing opportunity for me to begin outreach to teachers and meet students face to face. Last week, I began holding Native book clubs at the elementary level.

Additionally, we were awarded a \$500 grant to start up a Native Youth Mentorship Program. In order to gain feedback, a cultural identity survey was distributed in an effort to learn more about how our Native high school students view their Native identity. The results of this survey will help determine future programs and the new program title. Students should stay tuned for the chance to vote on a new program logo.

There is a lot on the horizon, as planning begins for the 2022-2023 school year. Please the slide deck from the most recent Indian Education Parent Committee Meeting (IEPC) <u>January 2022 IEPC Meeting</u>, which can also be found on the district <u>website</u>.
